

## **Executive Officer's Report**



Free flu jabs for Western Australians in May and June Western Australians are being urged to get their free influenza vaccine from next month, to help prevent severe illness ahead of this winter.

This significant cost-of-living relief measure will help to protect against the highly contagious influenza virus, which can severely affect the respiratory system and cause symptoms ranging from minor to life-threatening.

The most vulnerable community members, including older adults, young children and pregnant women, are most at risk of severe complications if they get influenza.

The best protection against influenza is immunisation and last year almost 32 per cent of eligible West Australians received an influenza vaccination.

Free influenza vaccines will be available to all Western Australians aged six-months and older, for the months of May and June. Some providers may charge a small administration fee.

Receiving the vaccine during these months will optimise protection over the peak period for influenza transmission in Western Australia.

Free vaccinations are available at GPs, Aboriginal Medical Services and participating community pharmacies.

#### Associations being deregistered

The Department of Commerce has circulated a list of 4,348 associations in WA that are facing de-registration due to an extended period of inactivity and / or not lodging Annual Information Statements.

If your club is still active but are included on the list, please ensure you constitution is up to date, you have lodged relevant statements, and your contact information is up to date with the department.

#### **Telstra 3G Network**

Please be aware that the 3G mobile network will soon be turned off. Vodafone has already done so however Telstra will turn their network off on 30 June and Optus will follow on the 31 August 2024.

As we are dependent on our mobile phones it is important that you confirm your phone will continue to work past this date. Telstra has a service available which will allow you to ensure your phone is compatible.

Simply SMS "3G XT" to this number, 3498. You will receive a message back almost instantly confirming your phone type and confirmation if your phone will be ok once the 3G mobile network is turned off.

Optus users should access a link via their website directly -Important Changes to 3G | Optus.

Also note for prepaid devices Telstra is phasing out the #100# recharge option. It will close by 30 June 2024 as part

of the 3G network closure. You can recharge your pre-paid service on the My Telstra app or online at recharge. Telstra. com.au.

You can also use their secure Recharge-by-Phone option for credit and debit card payments. Simply dial 125 100 free from your Telstra pre-paid service.

This recharge option is available only for credit and debit card payments and does not support voucher recharges.

In May, they have advised there'll be a new SMS option to recharge your service with a voucher by sending a text with the voucher number.

#### **WA Student Assistant Payment**

The WA Student Assistance Payment helps parents and carers with the cost-of-living pressures associated with sending their children to school. All Western Australian school students in Kindergarten to Year 12, with a valid WA student number, are eligible for this cost-of-living payment.

You can claim \$250 for each secondary student and \$150 for students attending primary school or Kindergarten. The ServiceWA app is the fastest and most convenient way to claim the WA Student Assistance Payment.

If you are unable to claim through the ServiceWA app you can submit a claim online or by posting in a claim form. Claims made through these methods will take longer to process - up to 30 days - and are less secure than applying through ServiceWA.

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## Shire President's Report

Grant Funded Projects and Successful Submissions
The Shire has been successful in obtaining the following grant funds:

\$500,000 – Cyclone Seroja Local Government Resilience Fund to upgrade the Recreational Centre for use as an Evacuation and Recovery Facility.

#### Works continue on;

Phases 3 and 4 of the LRCI (Local Roads and Community Infrastructure Program) funding projects, including;

- Installation of hard shade shelters foreshore adventure park
- Matting and beach wheelchairs for easier accessibility to town beach area
- Finalisation of an alternative pedestrian pathway to the Rec Centre
- New reticulation and resurfaced lawn areas town oval (completed)
- Installation of additional solar streetlights and CCTV cameras.
- There has also been a major upgrade to the gym and the equipment, and
- An upgrade to the interior of the 'George Weir' toilets.
- Phase 3 of the LRCI funding also supported an upgrade of the air conditioning systems in the Discovery Centre.

#### **Discovery Centre Improvements**

An entrance wall has been installed at the Shark Bay Discovery Centre to limit the wind and seagrass issues at the main entrance. The mini theatre housing the HMAS Sydney II permanent exhibition has also received a recent update.

#### **Childcare Staff Accommodation**

Department of Communities funding of \$25,000 per annum to subsidise accommodation for the Childcare Centre staff has once again been provided to the Shire.

#### Social Housing/ Independent Living Units

The Shire was successful in securing funding of \$4.2m from round 2 of the Social Housing Economic Recovery grants scheme to expand Denham's social housing infrastructure, including construction of 12 additional aged pensioner units. Work has now commenced on this project which will result in double the current number of Independent Living Units available for rental to eligible tenants.

#### **Coastal Risk Management**

Shark Bay was selected (via a competitive process) for geotechnical surveys to be undertaken along the coastline north and south of Knight Terrace. The results of these surveys will ultimately support the Shire's Coastal Hazard Management Plan for the Denham foreshore area.

\$2.2m has been secured from the Coastal Risk Program for the construction of a seawall – revetment along the foreshore in Denham township.

#### **Recreational Boating Facilities**

The \$314,413 funding secured via Department of Transport Recreational Boating Facilities Scheme has been utlised to build the recently finalised finger jetty at the western end of Knight Terrace, adjacent to the carpark.

#### **ANZAC Day Commemorations**

Services were held both at Dawn and 11:00am in Pioneer Park to commemorate ANZAC Day on 25th April. It is estimated that 250+ people attended the Dawn service and a further 120 attended the second service, which included a



contingent of members from the Patriots Return Service Motorcycle Chapter who had once again ridden up from Geraldton to participate in the event.

#### **Youth Week**

There was a strong attendance of both youth and adults at the CRC who participated in a wide range of activities, including art, craft (designing skateboards, canvas painting, etc.) as well as watched movies and played games.

#### **Local Club Development Program**

Via the Department of Local Government, Sport and Cultural Industries, \$21,600 has been secured to undertake a Club Development Program which will span a period of 3 years (2023-25).

Dibbler translocations to Dirk Hartog Island National Park are now complete and scientists from the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions (DBCA) and Australian Wildlife Conservancy work together to achieve the island's first conservation donation.

In 2019 and 2020, the Shark Bay bandicoot was returned to Dirk Hartog Island (Wirruwana) National Park as part of the Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project. Since that time, Australia's smallest bandicoot species (also known as a Marl) has prospered and the island population has grown so well that there are now sufficient numbers to allow a donation of animals to other conservation areas. Establishing new populations helps to safeguard the future of the Shark Bay bandicoot by ensuring we don't have "all of the eggs in one basket".

The Australian Wildlife Conservancy (AWC) is a not for profit organisation that works in partnership with other groups to protect wildlife and their habitats. Recently, AWC has teamed up with the New South Wales (NSW) National Parks and Wildlife Service to return six native animal species that have become locally extinct to the Pilliga forests in central-north NSW, including the Shark Bay bandicoot.

In September 2023, AWC ecologists teamed up with the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions' Return to 1616 fauna team to collect bandicoots from Wirruwana for relocation to NSW. Over 2 busy nights of trapping, close to 180 bandicoots were captured. Of these, 60 healthy male and female bandicoots were selected to start the new population in the Pilliga. Whilst on the island, AWC ecologists were delighted to encounter some of the other species that have been returned to the national park including the rufous hare-wallaby and Shark Bay mouse.

Once sufficient numbers of bandicoots were obtained. AWC ecologists carefully prepared their charges inside specially designed and approved animal carriers. They then accompanied them on their journey across Australia, first via helicopter to Denham and from there on a chartered flight to their new home in NSW, whilst monitoring them closely to ensure they were kept at a comfortable temperature.

#### Conservation Donation continued...

On arrival, the animals were given a health check before being released to a 5800 hectare fenced exclosure in the Pilliga State Conservation Area. This area has been made free of feral cats and foxes, creating a safe haven for bandicoots. For the staff who spent so much time and effort coordinating a complicated translocation, it was a very exciting moment to watch the bandicoots take their first steps in their new home. For the first time in over a hundred years, the ecosystem is benefitting from the diggings that bandicoots make as they search for food, including invertebrates and roots. This action helps to create healthy soil by improving soil moisture and nutrient content and contributes to the germination of native plants.

Since their reintroduction, careful monitoring of the newest inhabitants of Pilliga has revealed that they are settling in well and doing what Shark Bay bandicoots do best when given the opportunity ..... breeding! All of which bodes well for a bright future.




## Dibblers home and hosed

Last November marked not only the last dibbler translocation to Dirk Hartog Island National Park but also the completion of the dibbler breeding program at Perth Zoo. Over the last 26 years, over 1000 dibblers have been bred at the Zoo for release into suitable habitat. Of these, Dirk Hartog Island has received 203 dibblers as part of the *Return to 1616* Ecological Restoration Project. Kelly Gillen, Chair of the Gorgon Barrow Island Net Conservation Benefits Fund Advisory Board, was on hand and very excited to take part in the last release. "It was nothing short of amazing to see the incredible number of diggings and footprints of animals now living on the island" he said. "as well as the innovations that have been developed to manage such a large project".

## Who "dung" it? DNA detective work

One of the first native animal species to be translocated to Dirk Hartog Island National Park as part of the Return to 1616 Ecological Restoration Project was the banded hare-wallaby in 2017 and 2018. Following their reintroduction, a select few wallabies were given temporary radio collars to allow monitoring of their early progress.

But how are they doing several years down the track? With many more animals present and distributed over a much larger area, this question can be difficult to answer. One tool in the toolkit to allow scientists to monitor animals is cage traps. But banded hare-wallabies are well known for being 'shy' of conventional traps. In addition, their secretive behaviour of sheltering under dense shrubs can mean they're not easily seen on remote cameras either. All of which makes monitoring their progress a challenge.

There are, however, a range of other monitoring methods used to study animals, such as looking for tracks, droppings and other material that animals shed including hair and skin.

Given recent advances in genetic analysis techniques, it is now possible to determine a unique genetic 'fingerprint' for individual animals, which can be used, in the best forensic "whodunnit" style, to determine not only which species, but which individual animal DNA belonged to. Following on from this, could studying DNA in animal droppings provide a new method of monitoring populations ..... from dung?

To find out, a preliminary study to see if DNA could be retrieved from banded hare-wallaby droppings was undertaken during the 2018 translocation. This study showed

that every time a wallaby leaves behind some poo (or scat to give the more scientific term), they also leave behind some sloughed off intestinal cells that contain DNA. The results showed that it is indeed possible to gather DNA from harewallaby scats, and that because DNA slowly degrades once it is exposed to the elements, fresh scats less than two weeks old are the most useful.

In a piece of detective work worthy of Sherlock Holmes, the Return to 1616 fauna team used this information to successfully devise a new method of monitoring this species using scats!

Scats are collected from transects at the initial release site and along the leading edge of the population's expansion, selecting only fresh-looking scats.

In a highly streamlined approach, scientists in the DBCA genetics lab first test each scat to ensure it's from a banded hare-wallaby, as rufous hare-wallabies often live in the same area and their scats look the same. Next the scat is DNA 'fingerprinted' which allows individuals to be identified, counted and their location recorded. This is much less stressful than traditional monitoring methods for both wallaby and scientist.

This new and efficient monitoring method is helping to demonstrate that banded hare-wallabies have not only done well after their release but that their population is continuing to expand.

## Taking stock of no stock

The native vegetation of Dirk Hartog Island (Wirruwana) was severely impacted by the combined over grazing of introduced sheep and feral goats. With the purchase of the majority of the island by the State government and creation of a new national park in 2009, came an unparalleled opportunity to reverse this decline and restore the ecosystem of Western Australia's (WA) largest island with the *Return to 1616* Ecological Restoration Project.

Since the project's advent, the enormous effort to remove these non-native herbivores from the entire island, has made WA's largest island Dirk Hartog, the largest island in the world to be made free from feral goats and sheep.


The resulting dramatic regeneration of the native vegetation has been well documented with an ongoing monitoring program. This makes use of satellite imagery and aerial photography from drones, as well as more traditional collection of on ground photos from 36 designated points (called photomonitoring), and assessment of vegetation along both marked lines (called transects) and plots.

Since the removal of sheep and goats, the monitoring program shows there has been a significant increase in vegetation cover across nearly 40% of the island mostly in the south where sheep congregated around water points causing greater destruction of vegetation. Less change is evident in the north of the island where the vegetation is mostly Thryptomene heath which is less palatable to herbivores. As a result it was in better condition when herbivores were removed and has shown less change over time.

But the good news doesn't stop there. Although weeds such as buffel grass have increased in density after the removal of sheep and goats, they haven't spread over wider areas. It's now apparent that native plant species including wattle and spinifex are slowly winning the battle and managing to grow through thick buffel grass tufts!

The *Return to 1616* project's ongoing weed management plan aims to eliminate, manage or control other weed species on the island, depending on their severity.

After so many years of decline from non-native herbivores, the regeneration of Dirk Hartog Island National Park's vegetation is a slow process. With annual rainfall variation, some years are better than others, however, the vegetation monitoring program is clearly showing the rejuvenation of the island is slowly and steadily heading in the right direction.

## **DPIRD** - Fisheries

#### Roadside checks show good compliance by recreational fishers

Roadside operations in the Mid West and Gascoyne during the recent school holidays checked travellers for fishing offences and found a high level of compliance with WA's fishing laws.

Checkpoints south of Geraldton on the Brand Highway in Dongara and at the Overlander roadhouse on the North West Coastal Highway were operated by Department of Primary Industries and Regional Development (DPIRD) officers, with support from WA Police and the Department of Biodiversity, Conservation and Attractions.

The operations on 12 and 13 April found the majority of travellers abided by recreational fishing possession limits. DPIRD's Denham-based Supervising Fisheries and Marine Officer Matt Clarke said the Denham operation involved checks of 142 vehicles, along with any fishing vessels.

"It was great to see the vast majority of people doing the right thing," Mr Clarke said. "However, there were three warnings and four infringements issued to people for exceeding possession limits or for possession of totally protected fish, with one individual charged after being found to be 3.35 kgs in excess of his initial 10kg finfish possession limit.

"The public is reminded that when travelling their possession limit consists of 10kg of fillets from any finfish species, plus 10kg of fillets of large pelagic finfish such as mackerel, tuna and shark which must have skin attached for identification purposes."

Mr Clarke said the Brand Highway operation saw more than 750 vehicles come through the checkpoint with only two warnings issued for failing to tail clip recreationally caught western rock lobster.

Special operations like roadside checks are carried out around Western Australia each year and will continue to be part of DPIRD's strategy to monitor compliance with the State's fishing laws.

"The sentiment across both days was generally really positive from travellers, and also from local residents who are supportive of efforts to raise awareness and ensure people are following the rules to help protect our fish stocks," Mr Clarke.

Anyone who suspects any kind of illegal fishing activity is urged to report their concerns to FishWatch on 1800 815 507. If you have seen something involving fish or fishing which doesn't look quite right, the FishWatch phone line operates 24-7 for easy reporting, or alternatively use the online form on Crimestoppers.

To check on fishing rules by species and/or location in WA go to the Western Australian recreational fishing rules on the Fisheries website or the Recreational fishing guide 2023.

## Stop the interruptions - take back your phone from telemarketers and spam

Unwanted calls and spam SMS can be a source of frustration. Whether it's persistent telemarketers interrupting your dinner or irrelevant promotional texts flooding your phone, there are ways to put a stop to them. You may have forgotten about the Do Not Call register, which is a free service run by the Australian Communications and Media Authority (ACMA). Telemarketers then have 30 days to stop contact. The Do Not Call Register legislation applies not only to Australian telemarketers but also businesses within Australia that use overseas-based telemarketers and businesses based overseas making calls to Australian numbers. The register works by requiring telemarketers to submit a list of phone numbers they wish to call to the Register Operator. The Register identifies any numbers that are not permitted to be called and they are removed from calling lists.

Keep in mind research or survey related calls are not telemarketing, so you may still receive these, as well as calls from registered political parties, politicians, government agencies, election candidates, registered charities or educational institutions where you are or were a student. These are all exempt. However, there are still rules to be followed.

Telemarketers can only call between 9am-8pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturdays and never on Sundays. Researchers can call 9am-8.30pm Monday-Friday and 9am-5pm on Saturday and Sundays. Neither can call on a national public holiday. The caller must tell you their name, the name of their employer and why they are calling and their caller ID must not be blocked. They also must end the call if you ask them to.

Unfortunately scam calls won't stop after registration. A legitimate caller should not mind if you want to verify their identity. You should never give an unsolicited caller any personal or financial information, including credit card details, or access to your computer.

Receiving an SMS about a sale from your favourite clothing store is helpful but when do 'helpful' texts turn into unwanted spam? Marketing texts must also follow rules set out by ACMA. The business needs to have your consent, for example you ticked 'subscribe' on a form or entered a competition, include contact details and offer a way for you to unsubscribe or opt-out. After you unsubscribe or opt-out the business must generally stop sending marketing texts within five days.

You can report spam messages to ACMA by forwarding the message to their dedicated SMS line – 0429 999 888, or you can report it online via ACMA's spam complaint form. Also consider blocking the number on your phone. ACMA does take action and most recently issued penalties of over \$3.7 million to Luxottica (Sunglass Hut, Oakley, OPSM), Uber Australia, Kmart Australia and Ticketek for breaches of spam rules.

And just like with unsolicited calls, you may still receive text messages during elections or from registered charities and other Government bodies. More information about rules regarding telemarketers and spam texts can be found at acma.gov.au.

#### Cracking the code on diesel pricing with FuelWatch

Unleaded petrol (ULP) prices often grab the headlines but for many West Aussie drivers, diesel is the lifeblood that keeps their utes, trucks, 4WDs and family cars running.

Currently, Tuesday is the cheapest day to fill the tank with petrol, but Consumer Protection's FuelWatch team often receives questions asking when the cheapest day is for diesel. Diesel does not follow a price cycle in the same way ULP does. The ULP price cycle is a deliberate pricing strategy by the fuel companies. So, it's likely not profitable for them to initiate a similar price cycle for diesel given ULP is the primary fuel in the retail market.

So how are diesel prices set? Australia's wholesale diesel prices are driven by benchmark prices set in Singapore, which is the fuel storage and trading hub in the Asia-Pacific region. The diesel benchmark is generally higher than it is for ULP because of bigger demand in the region. Diesel is used extensively in electricity generation, mining, agriculture, and other primary industries. Given the higher wholesale price, and that the wholesale price makes up most of the retail cost of diesel, it's expected to see, on average, diesel prices sitting above ULP.

There are two types of diesel sold in WA – regular diesel and proprietary branded diesel. FuelWatch defines the proprietary branded diesel as simply 'brand diesel', whereas fuel companies market this as 'premium' diesel because it has a fuel system cleaning additive. Consider whether this is something your car needs before paying a higher price.

FuelWatch often receives complaints about high fuel prices in WA. The good news is data shows that year-to-date Perth has had the cheapest diesel on average in the nation. Last year Perth was equal cheapest with Adelaide and in 2022 Perth was the outright cheapest capital city. On any given day the price of diesel in the Perth metro area can vary by up to 40 cents per litre, this is why it pays to shop around. Buying diesel from the cheapest site rather than the most expensive, at a difference of 40 cpl, means you could potentially save \$34 on an 85-litre tank (average size of a 4WD tank). Over a year, with regular weekly fill ups, you could save \$1,768.

It takes less than 30 seconds to check the FuelWatch website at www.fuelwatch.wa.gov.au to find the cheapest diesel near you. As some retail sites sell both diesels while others only sell one type, Consumer Protection recommends using the purple toggle button on the FuelWatch website to quickly compare regular diesel and brand diesel prices to ensure you're always finding the cheapest option near you. It's also worth considering signing up for personalised alerts. If you're on a road trip, try using the interactive map, which allows you to expand, contract and scroll along the map to see where your cheap fuel stops could be.

## **Country Stargazing**

#### **Meteor Shower Spectacular**

Stargazers will be treated to a special display when the Eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower peaks this month. A meteor shower occurs when our planet Earth passes through the trail of debris left by a comet after it has completed its journey around our Sun. This shower is the result of Halley's Comet which orbits the sun once every 76 years. It's not due to return to Earth until 2061, however it still treats us to two meteor showers per year with the second shower being the Orionids on display in October.

The eta-Aquarids Meteor Shower is active from 19<sup>th</sup> April to 28<sup>th</sup> May with the peak happening on 6<sup>th</sup> May. With no Moon to wash out the views, it will be perfect conditions. It's predicted that there will be up to 30 meteors per hour at the peak of activity. It's worth watching this meteor shower in the days either side of the peak as well. Meteors can be seen in off-peak times too.

**When and where to look:** Early morning before sunrise on 6<sup>th</sup> May. Look near to Saturn in the east for the radiant point of this meteor shower.

#### **Magical Milky Way**

Another awesome sight to see in our spectacular dark night skies, is the band of the Milky Way, stretching right across the sky. From mid-autumn to mid-spring, we look towards the centre or core of our own galaxy and see a cloudy band of billions of stars that arcs from the south east to the south west. Many people around the world are unable to witness this breathtaking view due to light pollution, however out in country WA, we can enjoy the experience of seeing the stunning Milky Way Galaxy in all its glory.

When and where to look: Well after sunset on moonless nights are the best times to see the Milky Way. Look to the south east and south west.




